#### Welcome to the Annual Newsletter of 2024

Chairman's Report from Councillor Keith Blake

I would like to thank my fellow councillors for their support over the last twelve months. During that time Sara King who supported the Stables Lane Working Group has resigned but we have been able to welcome David Taylor and Emily Alderson as new councillors. We still have vacancies for two councillors so if you are interested, please contact the Clerk or give me a call for a chat. The Parish Council also works with the Ward Councillors on many issues, and we appreciate their continuing support.

The work on the Village Centre project was completed early in 2023 and it did cause some disruption with the contractors having to close off footpaths and part of the road at times, but the changes are designed to enhance the Village Centre making it better for all. New trees have been planted with new planters installed and the Parish Council are very grateful to Boston Spa in Bloom for taking on the new planters. Some minor remedial work is still outstanding, and we have also identified some faults with the car park entrance. Leeds City Council Highways are aware of the faults and are dealing with the contractors to resolve the problems.

An incident with a long lorry coming over the bridge and not being able to turn right at the top of Bridge Road without removing recently installed street furniture did highlight the issue of HGV's in Boston Spa. The Parish Council have asked if the signage can be reviewed.

As part of the Village Centre Project a number of Traffic Regulation Orders were put in place to enhance parking restrictions to improve parking in Bridge Close, Bridge Road, Church Mews and Westwood Way. With the exception of Westwood Way, the TRO's are in the process of being implemented. Westwood Way has been delayed for review with the Ward Councillors and Highways.

Stables Lane Park continues to be very well used and the PC is very grateful to the volunteers who do the litter picking and the working group that manages the maintenance of the park and its facilities. If you feel able to help with any of these working groups, please get in touch with the Clerk. Sara King was the Chairman of the Friends of Stables Lane Working Group and David Taylor has now stepped in. Our thanks go to Sara for managing the group and to David for taking over. Changes have been made to the park entrance to improve access and a new defibrillator has been installed next to the tennis courts. Due to the overall increase in usage some of the high wear areas around the play equipment had

worn with the surface sinking and becoming muddy and compacted. Early in 2024 we arranged for a new safety matting to be laid in high wear areas. This is a type of rubber mulch that provides a protective surface as well as a softer landing area. Further areas could be done if the need arises. The state of the car park has been of concern for some time and Kevin Alderson has led a project to have it improved. I am pleased to report that the budget has been approved and a contractor appointed to start the work. This will involve new drainage, surface treatment, marked parking bays and provision for an overflow area. Work will be starting soon, and details will be in the Parish Council e-newsletter.

Once again, last year's annual festival made good use of Stables Lane Park as well as the facilities in the Millennium Gardens and the Village Hall. The Saturday was not the best of days weather-wise, but Sunday saw the sunshine return with a good attendance and great family atmosphere.

Anti-social behaviour and vandalism continue to cause some problems at the park and the Leeds ASB team have been involved. However, I would urge anyone observing bad behaviour to report it to the Police on 101 or better still, the West Yorkshire Police website to ensure it's logged. Police & Communities Together (PACT) meetings are held on the first Tuesday of each month at 6.30pm in the Methodist Church in Wetherby. Details can be found on the WYP website and members of the public are welcome to attend to talk directly to the police.

The Parish Council continues to support the Village Hall and recent work has included upgrades to the Jubilee Room with improved lighting and insulation.

It was disappointing to hear that our application for Bathing Water Status was rejected by DEFRA and we understand that the criteria did not favour the situation in Boston Spa.

New contracts were placed for the maintenance of the green spaces in Boston Spa with three contractors. Unfortunately, the contractor for Church Fields did not meet expectations and the decision was made to re-advertise the contract and a new contractor familiar to Boston Spa has been appointed. Some work has already started on the Church Fields hedge and grassed areas and Mike Gadd is working with the contractor on the areas to be done. Mike and his team of volunteers are busy with hedge work as part of a longer-term project to reduce shading and make the area more ecologically sound. The Parish Council is very grateful to Mike and his team and if anyone would like to get involved, please get in touch with the Clerk.

The Parish Council commissioned a survey of the trees in woodland areas owned by us. The survey reported a large number of trees that are potentially at risk. The total figure is about 80 trees, but the majority are suffering from ash dieback so are not immediately at risk. The Parish Council has engaged with a contractor to look at trees close to the footpaths. About 20 have been identified which need to be removed or reduced to Eco Poles. Leeds Tree Services have approved the work, and this was started at the end of February. As the tree work was identified after the 2023-24 Parish Council budget was set for the year, we have had to increase 2024-25's budget to accommodate this.

After quite a long process to get the various permissions for the new bus shelter at St Mary's Church, it was installed in late summer 2023 with a refurbished bench and wheelchair space.

In regard to planning, the Parish Council has made representation to the LCC planners and the developers about creating a wildlife corridor between the planned Church Street development and Stables Lane Park to help provide an ecological area where wildlife can continue to flourish. The Boston Spa Neighbourhood Plan is now under review with ClIr Gail Bowen leading the working group consisting of councillors, local public members and representatives from Leeds City Council. In order to gauge opinion, two public sessions have been held to gather feedback. One at the Village Hall and the other at Deepdale Community Centre. Both were well attended and a total of 288 comments were made that the group will consider. Contact is being made with schools, local traders and other interested parties for further comments. Information on the ongoing process will be in the Parish Council minutes and newsletters and further public meetings will be held as the plan develops.

In Christmas 2023 the Parish Council commissioned Leeds Lights to install a series of LED based motifs and spiral lights on the lamp posts along the High Street and car park. We hope these new lights helped to enhance the village over Christmas. As part of the new light installation, three Tommy soldier motifs were installed around the war memorial in time for Remembrance Day. The Parish Council would welcome any feedback from residents on the new display.

As mentioned earlier, the Parish Council has two vacancies and anyone wishing to join should contact the Clerk. Members of the public are invited to join us at the monthly PC meetings on the third Monday of every month at 7.00pm. The first 20 minutes are set aside for the public questions and concerns.



#### **BOSTON SPA DAFFODILS**

There are many new residents in Boston Spa who may be interested in knowing who planted the daffodil bulbs and enjoy a little bit of village history.

The planting first started during autumn 2006 on both sides of the road from the roundabout at Moor End. Leeds City Council supplied the bulbs and a few volunteers in the village, who were organised by Boston Spa in Bloom, planted over half a tonne of bulbs during 2006. The bulb planting continued each year alongside Clifford Moor Road, Primrose Lane, and then anywhere else in the village along the roadsides wherever planting was practicable. The planting continued for about 5 years and was done by village residents with the majority of the bulbs supplied by Leeds City Council. Bob Sergeant has sent the below photographs taken between 2006 and 2009 when the daffodils were planted by village residents.









#### **BOSTON SPA ANGLING CLUB**

Club membership is open to residents of Boston Spa & surrounding villages living within three miles of the post office in Boston Spa. We have several miles of excellent river fishing offering a variety of challenging angling for the experienced or the beginner alike. There is general coarse fishing for a range of species including chub, barbel, pike, dace etc, or if you prefer, we have many keen fly-fishing members who cast for trout which we stock into the river in spring on an annual basis.

We have several work parties each year to keep the river in top condition and if you are a new member, it's a great way to pick the brains of the other members for info and tips on the best areas or baits. There is also a match (competition) section within the club who run regular fixtures throughout the year. One of the problems of fishing and working on a river like the Wharfe is the regular flooding which incurs more and more as the years go by. We've always endured winter floods but 2023 was exceptional to say the least! We are regularly down on the river constantly removing debris left by the receding flood waters deposited from miles & miles upstream, and to fill four large refuse sacks containing all manner of trash each time is sadly the norm.

#### **BOSTON SPA ACCESSIBILITY GROUP**

We are the Boston Spa Accessibility Group and we have been running a Facebook Page for a while now. A range of issues have been raised by members. We held the first group meeting recently, kindly hosted by Box Tree Court. We had three councillors, a representative from Boston Spa surgery and most importantly lots of interested local residents.

We spoke about access issues to shops and found out that Cohens Chemist now has a mobile ramp and grab rail. Andrew Morgan Opticians also has a mobile ramp. We want to see more improvements in this area, so more people can access their community.

We discussed disability parking, pavement parking and the problems it brings, as well as wheelie bins being left blocking paths. We talked about making sure the review of the Boston Spa Neighbourhood Plan takes accessibility into account and makes it a priority.

Lots of ideas were put forward about sharing information about cafes/restaurants that are accessible, shops becoming more accessible and encouraging shops to support the sunflower lanyard campaign and forget me not schemes.

Some of our group attended the February Parish Council meeting to highlight concerns about the pavement parking in front of Costcutter in particular. The PC has indicated additional measures will be considered to reduce this including additional planters which are fixed in position, bollards and signage.

It is an exciting time to join our Facebook group and get your voices heard. If you or someone you know is interested, please join us. We are interested to hear from those with lived experience and also those who want to be allies to our whole community.

#### **BOSTON SPA ARCHAEOLOGY AND HERITAGE GROUP**

Our fieldwork over the last 24 years has included excavation, field work, archaeobotany, and field walking. We have found evidence locally from Mesolithic (9000-4000 BC) through to modern times, including a prehistoric flint site with pitalignments containing ceremonial deposits.

At the request of West Yorkshire Archaeology Advisory Service, we drew up a list of Local Heritage Assets which people value in the area, including archaeology, ecology, history and geology. This was agreed by Boston Spa Parish Council and included in its Neighbourhood Plan. Copies can be found on our website and the Parish Council's.

Since Covid, monthly talks and most fieldwork have ceased. However, we keep a folder in Boston Spa and Wetherby Libraries where people can view reports of our work and discoveries. New volunteer waterers are always very welcome and are so important to continuing the good work.


The Planters outside CostCutter were replaced in the late Spring of 2023 as part of the High Street Scheme from Leeds Highways and the displays again received many appreciative compliments. As part of the identification of the increased pedestrian area and in very similar positions to their predecessors, their presence seems to have taken some drivers by surprise.

Many of the members of Boston Spa in Bloom are also involved with other volunteer organisations in the village and as an organisation we are pleased to support and give assistance to many activities in the village. We are involved with litter collecting, green group activities, the festival and the scarecrows, the gardening club, Deepdale Centre, bulb planting in open spaces and many other ways of contributing to the well-being of our village.

We are supported by sponsorship and support from the village and, as a totally volunteer organisation, the sponsorship of the baskets and the planters and the several flower beds is always not only very welcome but necessary for us to be part of the community – and very much appreciated.

There is a committee of currently 10 people who not only plan the displays and arrange watering teams but are also involved in maintenance of the equipment and the regular watering rota and looking to the future. The water bowsers have electric pumps, and the batteries are recharged with solar energy.

There is a certain pleasure from walking the High Street in early evening in the summer with the watering equipment and having a chat with passers-by. We would be pleased for you to be involved.



#### **BOSTON SPA, WETHERBY & VILLAGES GREEN GROUP**



2023 was the year the Boston Spa, Wetherby & Villages Community Green Group achieved **Charitable Incorporated Organisation** (CIO) status, ensuring we remain politically unaffiliated and have the capability to access national funding support for some of the big ideas we've got!

The year included many other highlights, thank you so much to all our members and volunteers that have helped deliver some amazing initiatives for our local community.

It began with a follow-up of our very successful **Eco Energy Fair**, with another event in January. Aiming to help share knowledge about home insulation, low carbon technology and other innovative solutions, along with local experts and forums for anyone to ask questions. The event attracted over 200 local people who gave some great feedback about the event. We've also continued to work with local organisations across our community with regard reducing the use of avoidable single use plastics, as an important part of helping our community achieve nationally recognised award for **Plastic Free Community** status. We are so close to achieving this award, we need just 2 more community groups and businesses to support the initiative and we can submit our communities application, read more here <a href="https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/plastic-free-community/">https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/plastic-free-community/</a>

July saw the group again support the **Party in the Park** event on Stables Lane, working with all the vendors and the Parish Council to ensure that we didn't use avoidable single use plastic and we minimised the amount of waste that went to landfill, by segregating food/compostable waste and recycling. <a href="https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/news/party-in-the-park-boston-spagoes-eco-friendly-again/">https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/news/party-in-the-park-boston-spagoes-eco-friendly-again/</a>

Throughout the year we've continued to collect unwanted bikes and with the help of some amazing volunteers fixed them and then donated to the underprivileged. At last count we'd donated 600 bikes since the launch of the **Big Bike Fix** scheme! https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/big-bike-fix/

September saw our journey with Lady Hastings Primary School with their ambition to attain **Eco Schools Green Flag** award this year. We've formed an EcoCouncil of engaged youngsters, completed their environmental review and selected litter, energy & biodiversity as their focus for this school year.

November saw COP28 and us run our first **Community Action forum** (<a href="https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/news/have-your-say-about-a-better-future/">https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/news/have-your-say-about-a-better-future/</a>), where we had a variety of speakers talk to the community about other initiatives that have been successful in other local communities. Ideas such as hydro energy creation, community food fridges, community 'library of things' and local growing initiatives. There was then an opportunity for local people to share their ideas with regard various topics, and it will be some of these we hope to explore in the coming year ahead.

The winter season also saw the group get back into the **tree planting** season (working with LCC Woodland Creation team), with more trees planted around the village and at Wattle Syke. As well as working with the Parish Council throughout the year rewilding areas at bottom of Holgate Lane and natural fencing on Churchfields.

By the end of the year, we also became aware of the closure of the Colgate & Walkers **Terracycle** schemes. Thanks to our community partners Yeadon's (Boston Spa) and YBS (Wetherby), we've collected 1000s of used crisp packets, toothpaste tubes and brushes, read more <a href="https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/waste-recycling/">https://bostongreengroup.co.uk/waste-recycling/</a>. Crisp packets are now collected by local supermarkets and Boots (Wetherby) are collecting hygiene items.

As our ambition and our membership has grown, we've also moved our **monthly newsletter** to a platform that makes it more manageable for us. #### **BOSTON SPA ENERGY EFFICIENCY TRIAL (BEET)**

The BEET trial has now gone live in the Boston Spa and Wetherby area.

Homes and businesses across the whole of the UK are currently receiving electricity voltages which are higher than they need to be. This causes higher than necessary consumption and we are all paying for it in our electricity bills. Nobody has told you, but it has been a big waste of energy for decades. Northern Powergrid (previously YEB and NEEB) are a privatised monopoly and they provide the cable into your property and are responsible for maintaining the voltage delivered. The OFGEM regulations are lax and do not challenge them to optimise the voltage, so they have kept the voltage higher than necessary, and we have all been losing out.

Keith Jackson, one of our residents, had a career in the electricity industry and became aware of higher than necessary voltage in his home and realised that he was not alone. He has spent the last 10 years investigating and lobbying the OFGEM regulator and government. They encouraged him to make contact with Northern Powergrid (NPg). Northern Powergrid listened to his findings and warmly accepted the challenge by assembling a project team (including Keith) to investigate voltage optimisation. The breakthrough came when they realised that smart meters send customer voltage details every 30 mins. Never before had real time voltage at the customers' terminals been available to the network company. The BEET project interrogates the far end voltages and sends signals to the control room so that the despatch voltage can be safely trimmed.

The project called BEET (Boston Spa Energy Efficiency Trial) became operational in mid-January 2024. About 15,000 customers in the Collingham, Bramham, Boston Spa, Wetherby, and Tockwith areas are already benefitting. It is anticipated that electricity bills will drop by about 3-4% and the planet will benefit because emissions at the power stations will be reduced too. Once proven, Northern Powergrid plan to roll out the programme across the whole of its franchised area and deliver the benefits to nearly 4 million customers. #### **BOSTON SPA RUBBISH TEAM**

We are a voluntary litter picking group which meets roughly once a month to litter pick in and around our village. Some members go out independently of the group on a more regular basis, namely at Deepdale and the road up to the A1 and around the central shopping area. We have the full support of the Parish Council and the LCC ward councillors, one of whom picks with us when she is available.

The recent storms with high winds have not helped us lately, having blown litter everywhere, but generally we are heartened that the village is looking reasonably neat and tidy. There have been a few successful changes since our newsletter last year: the two bins on the riverside by the bridge which were continually overflowing with dog waste bags, have been removed and replaced with one round the corner which is accessible by LCC litter truck which enables it to be emptied by LCC instead of us! Thank you LCC for listening to us. The litter problem outside Londis is now better managed with two LCC bins and the yellow plastic recycling bin (although this is a bit of an eyesore). The new bin and litter situation by the bus stop at the top of Clarendon Road is also much improved, although this might be due to less usage of the bus stop, now the buses are only hourly.

There seems to be only one major litter problem within the village that we are currently struggling with, this being the bottle bank and charity clothing bank at the entrance to Deepdale. There are two issues: the cardboard boxes, carrier bags and general packaging that is left there, having deposited your bottles; and relating to the charity bank, the leaving of non-acceptable items (toys, curtains, car seats, and general household goods) which is just dumped around on the floor. Can we stress that this 'stuff' is NEVER taken by the people who empty the metal charity bank, as they only take the stipulated items that are WITHIN the metal bank. The 'stuff' that is dumped around is also exposed to the elements, so becomes wet and dirty. So please don't be lazy - take your cardboard boxes, carrier bags etc home and use for your next load of bottles, and with the unacceptable charity items there are options: take it to the Martin House donation depot on Thorp Arch Trading Estate, take it to either of the two charity shops in the village or if there is a lot of stuff, ring a charity for them to collect from your house. It really is unacceptable that we as volunteer litter pickers should have to clear this mess up, often having to load it up and put in our own bins at home. This is classed as fly tipping, for which you will be fined.

Unfortunately, the environs of Boston Spa continue to keep us busy. The two roundabouts at the top of the village, the slip roads and the A168 Boston Road to Wetherby are always strewn with litter, with the lay-by on the A168 a major unsightly problem. Whilst these areas are obviously not in our village, it does set

the standard for the approach/exit to Boston - it is upsetting to regularly drive past such an unsightly litter strewn area on your doorstep. We want the approach to be welcoming and attractive, just like our village.

Some of our group also undertake tree guard removal on the A168 Boston Road (Wattle Syke roundabout to Wetherby). Since our report here last year, we have made great progress in removing these unsightly objects (both from the trees and picking up from the cycle path and general area) and just have a small remaining stretch to address. One of our team also works on tree guard removal at the top of Winnow Lane by the cycle track and is making good progress there.

Please do your bit to keep our lovely village, and environs, neat and tidy. You can:

- remind and encourage your children to bin it or take it home
- if you're a dog walker no dog pooh bags tied on trees
- pick up the odd piece of litter in the village and bin it
- report fly tipping to LCC

#### ST MARY'S CHURCH

The past year has seen a growth in numbers and activities at the parish church of Boston Spa. Congregation numbers on Sundays have returned to pre-lockdown levels, and it was wonderful to see the church packed for Remembrance Sunday (with a great showing from the local uniformed organisations) and for the Crib

Service on Christmas Eve in particular. Connections Cafe on Sunday morning has also grown. Led by Jo Davies, this informal "cafe church" offers a drop in to meet and chat, a "pause for thought" reflection on a Bible passage, and some activities for children. A new side-shoot of Connections was launched in the autumn: a monthly Sunday evening service called Flourish where the teaching is conversational and interactive, and the worship combines contemplative videos and music. The Ark, run by the Mothers' Union, continues to offer a friendly fortnightly drop in for parents and carers with their babies and young children, with games and activities available as well as a short act of worship involving singing, actions and prayers. Our summer Holiday Club was themed around Creation and featured a dinosaur called Tracy. Many thanks to all the local volunteers who made the magic happen!

The church is frequently used by local schools not only for their end of term and end of year services, but also as a classroom for R.E. and other subjects throughout the year. Concerts and events such as quizzes and a Christmas Cornucopia (involving local stallholders) have also seen the church well used. The Parish Room is also well used by local groups including Beavers, an Italian class, a book club, committee meetings of local organisations, and the Mothers' Union whose ministry at St Mary's continues to thrive.

Our vicar, the Rev'd Nick Morgan celebrated the fifth anniversary of his arrival here in November 2023 and now oversees four village churches in addition to St Mary's: St Peter's, Walton; All Saints', Thorp Arch; St Luke's, Clifford and All Saints', Bramham. Rev'd Nick is also Area Dean, sits on York Diocesan Synod and is a member of the Vocations Team of York Diocese. The staff team also includes the Reverend Trish Anslow and Rev'd Glenda Webb, as well as our Connections Minister, Jo Davies and Emma Hunter our Parish Administrator and PA to the vicar. Home communions and pastoral visits are offered by a team of clergy and members of the congregation.

St Mary's Choir was augmented by many members of the local community for the Carol Service. We are looking for opportunities to involve this larger Community Church Choir in other activities between Christmasses - look out for these events in 2024! We welcome new choir members throughout the year. Please contact the Parish Office if you are interested.

Many thanks to our volunteers who maintain the churchyard in all weathers - such an extensive site requires a lot of hard work, and anyone wishing to join this hardy

team who usually work on Thursday mornings are welcome to enquire via the Parish Office.

One unwelcome development over 2023 was vandalism which repeatedly took place inside church, causing damage to the organ and a risk of fire from misuse of candles. This meant restricting the hours which church remained open for private prayer to those when we could safely staff the site. A CCTV system is due to be installed in 2024 and we look forward to being able to safely keep the village's parish church open to parishioners and visitors alike for longer every day in the near future.

#### **BOSTON SPA VILLAGE HALL CIO**

The Hall is an independent charity which is run by a group of Charity Trustees and volunteers. It's a predominant feature in the centre of the Village. All our income is from the hire of the various rooms and fundraising events, once bills are paid any excess income is ploughed back into maintaining and improving the building. The Hall was built in 1909 and is constantly in need of maintenance, repair and updating.

This year we received a grant from Biffa Award, the Garfield Weston Foundation, the Bernard Sunley Foundation, Boston Spa Parish Council and Wetherby Ward Councillor Penny Stables to refurbish the Jubilee room. The work took place over the summer and with a lot of hard work by our contractors and Trustees, particularly Phil Harrison and Joanne Sabin. We re-opened the room in September.

#### ROOMS FOR HIRE

The Hall has four rooms for hire all with good car and cycle parking.

#### **Main Hall**

This is a large room with its own stage capable of hosting musical and drama events. It has a full-service kitchen and toilet facilities. The floor is wooden making it suitable for dancing, exercise and it can even be used for some racquet sports. There is a versatile PA system. The system can be used separately or collectively in all three main rooms.

#### Café area

The café attached to the main hall is transformed into the WiSE Community café on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday each week. The cafe is well established and attracts many visitors. Do call in to see what is on offer, they are open between 9.30am and 3.00pm.

#### **Jubilee Room**

This is a good-sized room with its own entrance, toilets, and small kitchen for serving drinks and snacks. It has parquet flooring and can seat up to eighty people. The room is used for a variety of activities and meetings and is a useful alternative to the main hall.

#### Lantern Room

This is a carpeted room with toilets and has access to the small kitchen where drinks and snacks can be prepared. A feature is the large lantern rooflight that is illuminated with low energy lighting during the hours of darkness.

#### **Committee Room**

This is a smaller room with a large table and comfortable seating for up to 8 people. If you are working from home and need somewhere to meet, consider using this room.

### ST JOHN'S CATHOLIC SPECIALIST SCHOOL

This year our students have had some lovely opportunities to work with our local communities and those further afield.

Guests from Jazz in the Spa came to a summer concert and gave us a generous donation to purchase some musical instruments to achieve our mission to give every pupil the chance to learn a musical instrument and take it home to practice. Our visitors enthusiastic support in the concert really helped our nervous musicians.





In our Interfaith Week we welcomed members of different faith communities in Leeds; Anna who is Jewish, Navinder who is Sikh and Seema a Hindu. We really appreciate that they gave up their time to help us understand the values and traditions of their religions.

In November, we paid our respects to those soldiers who died in both world wars. We visited the graves of Private Rafferly and Corporal Szkandera who are buried in St Edward's churchyard. A few years ago, a member of staff from St John's researched Corporal Szkandera and obtained a photo of the young airman which is stored in St Edward's Church.

As usual, our Christmas Fayre was a lovely occasion, well supported by the community. We also welcomed ex-students from Nottingham, Lincolnshire, Beverley and Newcastle, who brought their partners and even children! These young people also visited during Deaf Awareness week, describing their careers in fields as diverse as cyber security, nursing and university students.

Some of our current students had the confidence to take part in the Leeds SEND Partnership Board takeover event at Leeds Civic Centre. They articulated their views very clearly about the quality of the services available for young people with SEND, how they should be publicised and what needs to be improved.

St John's is also proud to have achieved a range of awards. We gained the Autism Specialist Provider Award and our commitment to young people's mental health and wellbeing has been recognised by staff presenting at national conferences for SAPHNA (School and public health nurses association) and BATOD (British Association of Teachers of the Deaf). Also, our chickens were officially recognised as being of star quality when we won first prize at Bramham show for exhibiting 3 hen's eggs.





#### **MARTIN HOUSE**

Martin House Children's Hospice on Grove Road supports over 500 families of children with life-limiting conditions across North, East and West Yorkshire annually. We offer planned respite stays, symptom control, emergency and end of life care as well as bereavement support for over 150 families each year. Open 24/7, 365 days a year, we have specialist paediatric doctors and nurses available around the clock to support the families who need us the most.

Martin House provides all services free of charge and receives only 10% statutory funding. It costs nearly £9 million a year to provide this care. We rely on the generosity of our donors giving voluntary donations and supporting our fundraising events.

Our biggest local fundraising event, Glow Together, took place for the second time in October 2023, right here in Boston Spa. Together with over 250 participants turning out in head to toe 'glow' as well as local businesses 'glowing up' the route, not only were the streets of Boston Spa lit up in style, we also raised over £10,000. This fantastic amount could help us to provide end of life care for a baby, child or young person, allowing their family to spend precious time with their loved one, providing symptom control at end of life and care after death in one of our cooled bedrooms. Look out for Glow Together 2024, the date for your diary is Saturday 16th November.



You may have spotted the construction site entrance to the side of Martin House and wondered what we're up to? Since opening our doors in 1987, advancements in clinical research and palliative medicine have resulted in children and young people living for longer, with more complex needs. Our facilities need to change to ensure families continue to receive the highest quality care in modern, well-equipped surroundings. We need more space for specialised life-sustaining equipment as well as purpose-built facilities, so we have embarked upon an ambitious £21.9m transformational project to extend and refurbish the hospice.

**THE BUILD** will offer dedicated wellbeing areas, improved accessibility, enhanced social and private spaces, alongside modernised facilities for all of our families. This will enable us to match our facilities to the outstanding standards of care that all staff and volunteers at Martin House are committed to delivering and continue to be the hospice that children, young people and families deserve.

#### WETHERBY & DISTRICT LIONS

Firstly, a big thank you to all our supporters. You helped make 2023 another greaaattt year! With over 1.3 million members in over 200 countries our purpose is to serve the community and bring communities together. Our local club serves the area from Wetherby to Boston Spa and onto Tadcaster and nearby villages including Harewood, Scarcroft and Spofforth.

The year started with one of our regular and very popular events, the Senior Citizens Party, at Wetherby High School with 200 residents joining us for lunch and entertainment. Throughout 2023 we worked with the local community and businesses to put on and support a number of local events and raise funds.

2023 saw two firsts. In July we worked with the Wetherby Bandstand Trust to stage Wetherby's first Drover's Day with marching bands from across the north of England marching through Wetherby to the bandstand reviving some of the history of Wetherby. We had some great support for this as part of Leeds 2023. We have been nominated for a Leeds Compassionate City Award and plan to make it an annual event. Look out for the bands in 2024!

In November we held our first ever fashion show with the support of a local ladies clothes shop, Best Kept Secrets, (now based in Harrogate). This was a lot of fun and a hugely successful fundraiser for us. We've worked with other local organisations, coordinated the car parking for the Wetherby 10k, run a flat cap throwing competition at Tockwith Show and our ever-popular Cuddly Lions tombola has been to school fairs and shows raising valuable funds.

Grant giving is part of our work and we have supported a number of individuals buying equipment to improve their lives. One of our larger grants went to Martin House Children's Hospice to help them to install a sensory garden.

We finished the year with another favourite, the Dickensian Christmas Market and the presentation of the 2024 Townsperson of the Year award to Kazia Knight in recognition of the vast amount of work she has done for the local community. December was a busy month for Santa as he took his sleigh to the streets of Wetherby entertaining children and collecting for our charitable causes.

As well as serving our local community the Lions, as part of an international organisation, raises funds for causes overseas. This year, with the help of the residents of Wetherby and surrounds, we were able to give £1,000 towards the purchase of a fire engine for use in the Ukraine. We teamed up with the Harrogate Soroptimists "Toilet Twinning" providing toilets for people in developing countries

and reminding us that current toilet provision for some is neither safe nor hygienic. Finally and with your help we collected 40 kilogrammes of used spectacles donated to opticians in Wetherby by the general public. These will be used by people in Africa who would otherwise go without.

West Yorkshire Police has launched a new and updated version of the messenger system "West Yorkshire Community Alert". Community Alert is a system West Yorkshire Police has been using since 2019, allowing officers across the county to update the public direct with news, updates and appeals on matters that are happening on their doorstep. This new Community Alert has also been updated to include a range of new benefits, such as the ability for officers to send hyperlocalised messages to the public by drawing round a particular area or postcode. West Yorkshire Police Crime Prevention Officer Paul Denison said:

"Community Alert is a fantastic service as it gives the public a simple way of keeping up to date with what we're up to in their local area, especially those who may not have social media. It is also an invaluable investigative tool - and can be used to appeal for information or intelligence and help to solve crime. It's a great service we can provide to the public as users are able to engage with us and receive real-time updates on issues that are affecting where they live, and they can also choose what updates they'd like to receive on things that matter to them."

Public registration is free, and people can choose to receive news and appeals, local crime information and/or prevention advice direct via email, text or voice message. Have you signed up yet for our WY Community Alert messaging system? Remember, your personal data is absolutely safe, it's strictly controlled and the system is fully GDPR compliant. # WETHERBY IN SUPPORT OF THE ELDERLY (WISE)

Wetherby in Support of the Elderly (WiSE) is a small local charity which aims to improve quality of life for the over 60s in Wetherby and surrounding villages.

The charity's work enables older people to live at home, whilst reducing social isolation. WiSE's core services include befriending, information and advice, grass cutting, transport scheme, Send a Smile Scheme and regular social activities to reduce isolation and loneliness. The charity's Memory Café to support people living with dementia and their carers is now well established. Its popular Welcome Café (formally the pay-as-you-feel café) for those struggling with the cost-of-living crisis, has been extended indefinitely due to popular demand of the service.


WiSE has had an incredible year in each of its services. In one year alone, there has been around more than 5,000 attendances at social events. There was an incredible 9,573 visitors to the WiSE Owl Café at Boston Spa Village Hall, 392 attendances at the Memory Café and 444 grass cuts carried out in conjunction with Wetherby Young Offenders Institute. The charity's volunteer driver transport scheme provided 708 transport journeys and there were 806 Information & Advice contacts for the year, supporting 400 people. WiSE also sent 1,248 cards to the community thanks to the Send a Smile Scheme, plus additional 630 birthday cards to friends and volunteers.

The charity's befriending volunteers have kept in touch with lonely and isolated friends throughout the year, providing 432 hours of visits and calls. None of this would have been possible without 121 amazing WiSE volunteers, who provided a massive 4,776 hours of their own time. A huge thank you to everyone who made this happen.

As 2024 progresses, WiSE wants to continue to building on these successes by enchanting its core services. To do this effectively it is appealing for volunteers, fundraisers and corporate sponsors in all different areas.
